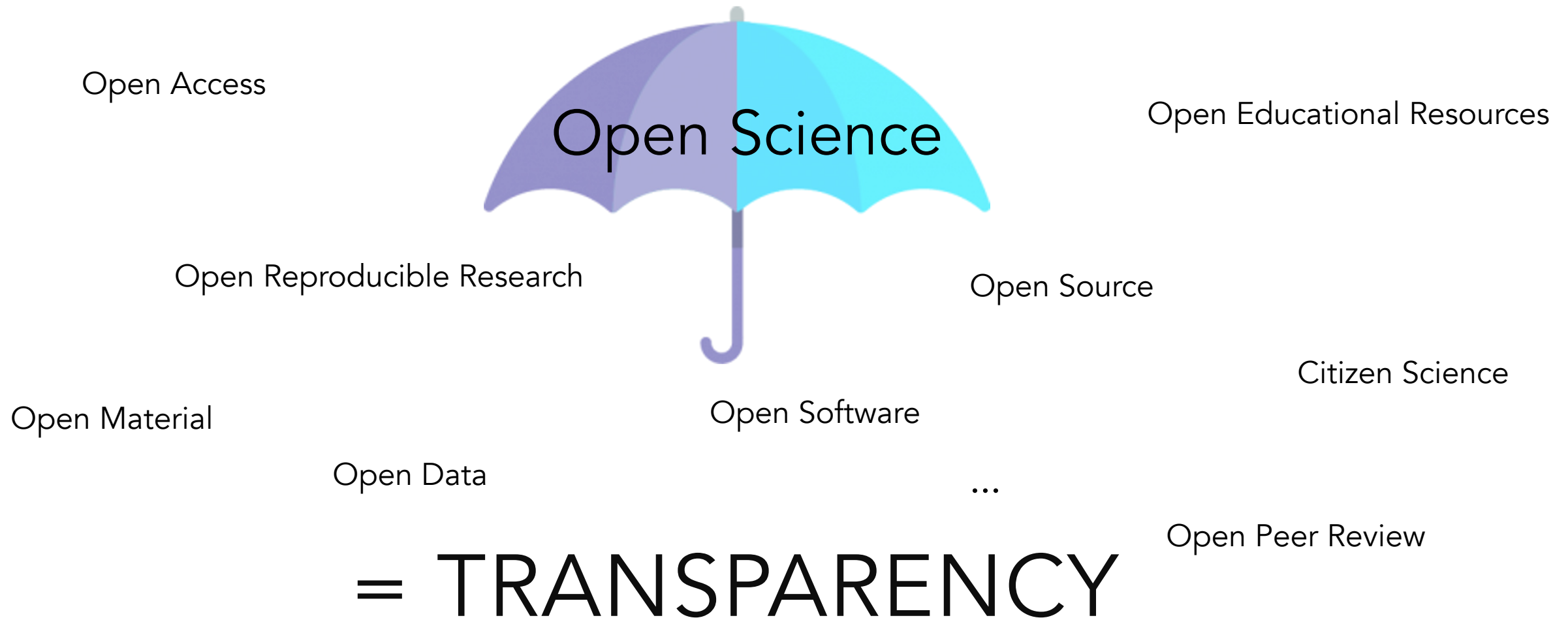

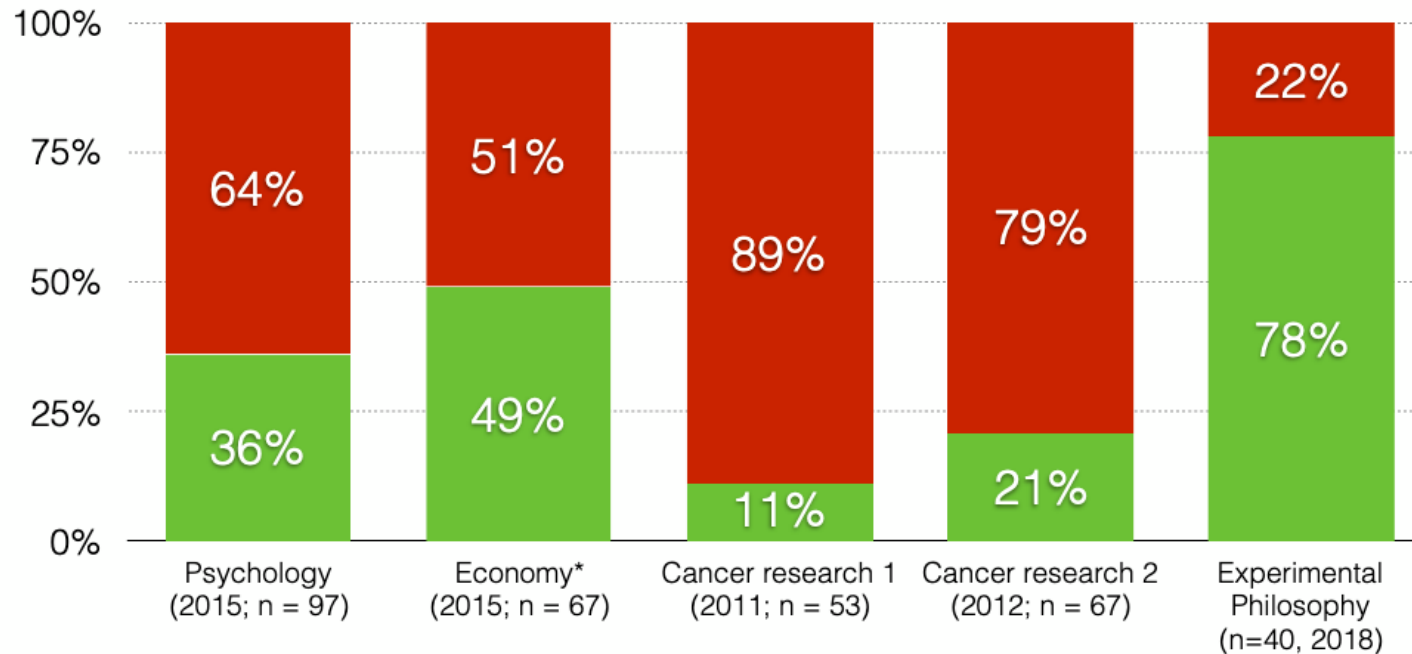

 - 37% ([Open Science Collaboration, 2015](#))
 - 50% ([Many Labs, 2018](#))

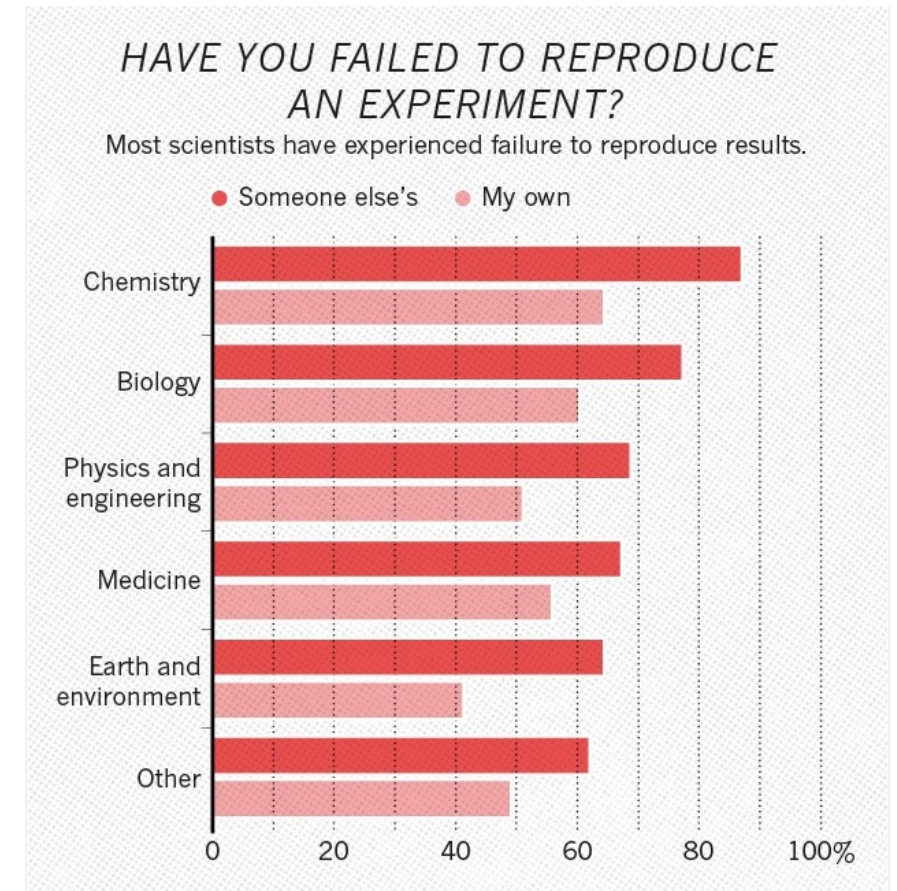

Frankfurt Open Science Initiative

- Founded in 2018 at the department of psychology at GU
- 12 board members, 16 supporting members
 - No hierarchies
 - Voluntary based
 - Ideal: all levels represented
 - We include all levels from Bachelor students up to full professors

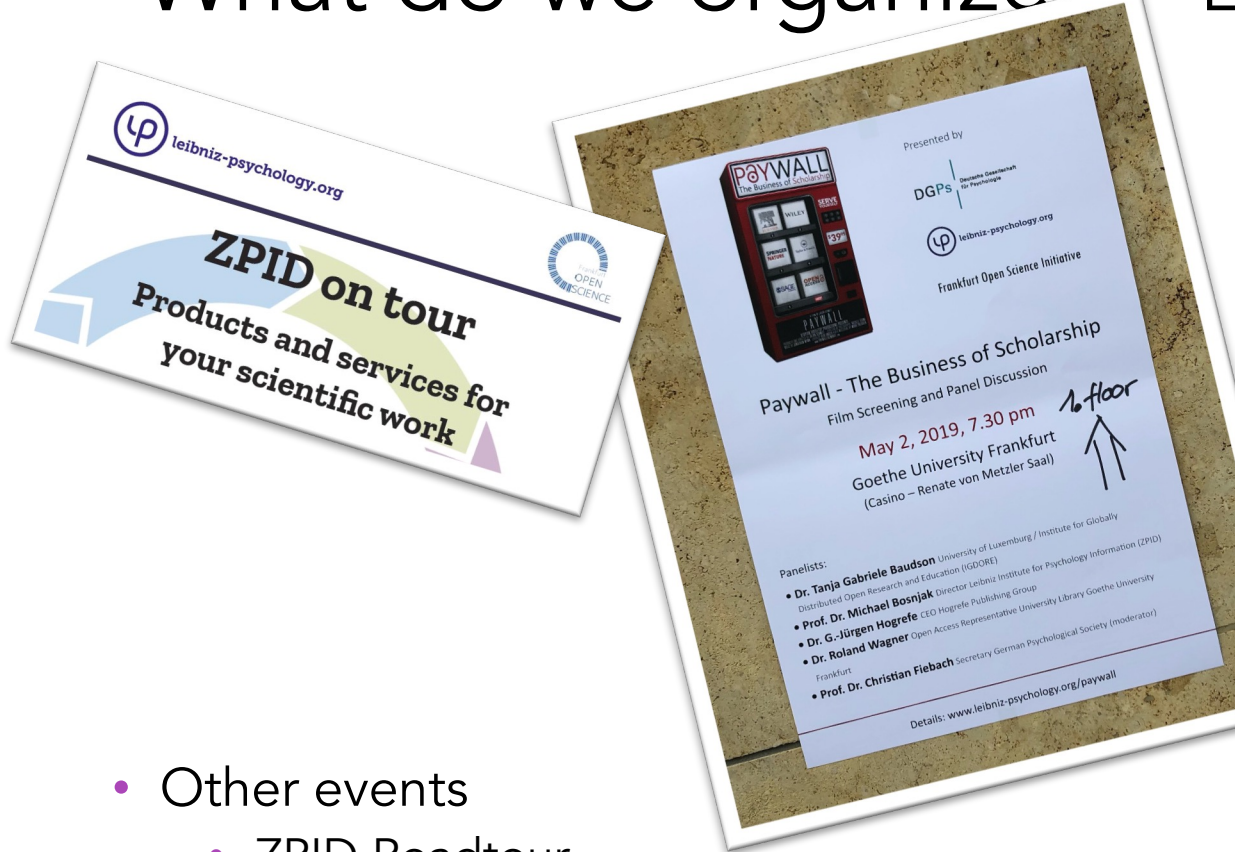

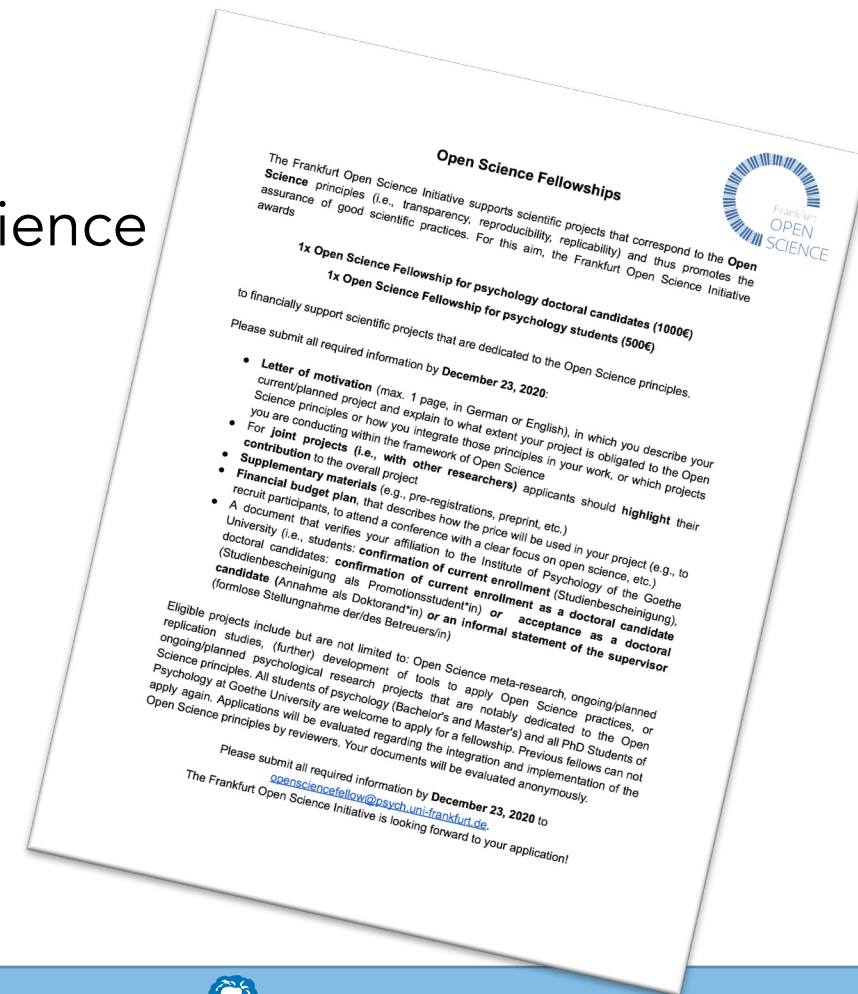

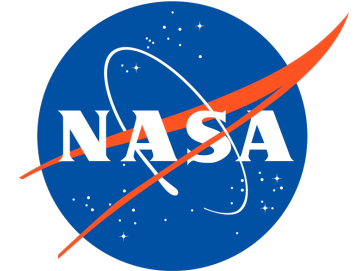
What do we organize? – Open Science Fellowships
