


Open Science – why do we need it?

- Replication crisis in psychology
- Replication rates of
 - 37% (Open Science Collaboration, 2015)
 - 50% (Many Labs, 2018)





^{*}The data on economics is about *reproducibility*; i.e. the attempt to get the same results if you apply the original data analysis on the original data set.



- Open Scholarship Grassroots Community Networks (> 220)

Frankfurt Open Science Initiative

- Founded in 2018 at the department of psychology at GU
- 12 board members, 16 supporting members
 - No hierarchies
 - Voluntary based
 - Ideal: all levels represented

- open for everyone! ©


