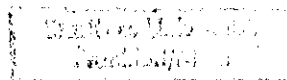

A D V E R T I S E M E N T.

THE catalogue, now offered to the public, of the collection of pictures belonging to king Charles the first, was transcribed by the late curious and industrious Mr. VERTUE, from a MS. in the Ashmolean Musæum, and was by him prepared for the press, part of it being actually printed off before his death. The catalogue appears, from pages 57 and 63, to have been taken by one Vanderdoort, keeper of the king's cabinet, pictures, jewels, &c. who had before served prince Henry in the same employment: and indeed, from every page, it appears not to have been compiled by an Englishman, the language in many places being barely intelligible; in none, tolerably pure. Yet it was apprehended, that putting it into a new dress might have destroyed much of the fidelity of the descriptions, which seem very accurately taken; and as elegance of diction is by no means a necessary ingredient to a catalogue, it is hoped that the curious will prefer the rude original, in it's native truth, to a more polished, but perhaps less faithful narrative.

KING Charles's collection was one of the most celebrated in Europe: he loved, he understood, he patronised the arts. Not having the fortune to find great genius's in painting among his own subjects, he called over some of the ablest masters of other nations —

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a commendable partiality to foreigners, as it tended to enrich and instruct his own country. Nor did he confine his expence to artists: besides separate pieces, he purchased the celebrated collection of the duke of Mantua; having first laid a foundation in what he inherited from his brother, the amiable prince Henry, who, as appears from this catalogue, had, amongst his other qualifications, a taste for pictures, and a noble zeal for encouraging the arts.

It is recorded of king Charles, that at one time he made a present of ultramarine to the value of five hundred pounds to Vandyke and Mrs. Carlisle, a celebrated paintress; and the immense price of eighty thousand pounds, which his majesty is said to have agreed to pay to the same great master, for illustrating the banquetting-house with the ceremonies of the garter, is rather a comment on the magnificence of the prince, and the genius of the painter, than probably a matter of fact.—That noble chamber was soon destined to a more melancholy solemnity!

THE stroke that laid Royalty so low, dismissed the painter, and dispersed the royal virtuoso's collections: the first cabinets in Europe shine with it's spoils. The few fine pieces thinly scattered through the royal palaces at home, are chiefly what were saved or reassembled of king Charles's splendid gallery: the Dutch are reported to have purchased and restored some to his son: the best part are buried in the gloom, or perishing in the vaults,

of the Escorial. The late prince of Wales, who had begun to assemble a fine collection, proposed to acquire as many as possible of king Charles's pictures—but painting has still been unfortunate in Britain!

THE fire of Whitehall contributed to destroy what rebellion and rapine had spared. Many portraits of royal persons, of whom no image is left, perished in those flames. The fairest works of the natural Holbein, and the exquisite Isaac Oliver, were probably lost there: works so valuable, that the memory of them, preserved in this rude transcript, must recommend it to the judicious and curious reader.

A STILL farther view is aimed at. Catalogues of this sort are deservedly grown into esteem: while a collection remains entire, the use of the catalogue is obvious; when dispersed, it often serves to authenticate a picture, adds to its imaginary value, and bestows a sort of history on it. It is to be wished, that the practice of composing catalogues of conspicuous collections was universal: and perhaps even this, so coarsely executed, may tend to incite more elegant imitations. Hitherto, this Vanderdoort, and one or two foreigners scarce better qualified, have been the chief illustrators of British Museums. One Gambarini began with Lord Pembroke's collection, and made pompous promises of proceeding with what he was incapable of executing well. There is another account of the pictures and statues at Wilton*: the

coins and medals have been published in a fair edition. Many of the duke of Devonshire's and doctor Mead's appear in Haym's *Tesoro Britannico*. These, and the *Ædes Walpolianæ*, are, I think, the only descriptions of the riches of a country, which for some years has been assembling the arts and works of the politest nations and greatest masters.

THE establishment of the British Musæum seems a charter for incorporating the arts, a new æra of *virtù*. It is to be hoped that collections, wont to straggle through auctions into obscurity, will there find a center! who that should destine his collection to the British Musæum, would not purchase curiosities with redoubled spirit and pleasure, whenever he reflected, that he was collecting for his country, and would have his name recorded as a benefactor to it's arts and improvements? and when so fair a foundation is laid, if pictures and statues flow in to books and medals, and curiosities of every kind, may we not flatter ourselves, that a British academy of arts will arise; at least that we shall not want great masters of our own, when models are prepared, and our artists can study Greece and Rome, Praxiteles and Raphael, without stirring from their own metropolis?

Item. The twenty-sixth, being the old Prince of Orange; and a bird, at the other side, taking a piece of bread that is upon the water.

Item. The twenty-seventh, an Austrian Earl; at the other side, his lady, being very well done.

Item. The thirtieth, Erasmus of Rotterdam.

Item. Maximilian, brother to the deceased Emperor Rodolph II.

Item. A piece at one side Hercules's head; at the other side, a woman with a lion's skin.

These are the aforespecified thirty-two brazen medals.

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Bought by the KING of Mr. Endymion Porter. Item. A fellow piece of the aforesaid, being also in white ivory set upon black velvet; in a black ebony frame, other two children standing fighting.

Done by Petitot, an excellent enameller in France. Item. Carved in box, a standing Lucretia, from that which is now in the cabinet-room of Titian's painting.

Given to the KING by Mr. Surveyor, Inigo Jones. Item. In a round old shutting ordinary box in a worm-eaten rotten frame, the picture of KING Henry VIII. imboft in coloured wax.

Given to the KING by Mr. Surveyor. Item. More in a long oval ordinary box, wherein is a pattern upon copper, emboft in wax, of many little figures, for a scabbard of a sword for KING Henry VIII.

Done by Francisco Cleyne six, and two thereof by Hoskins. Item. In a little book, wherein are six drawings upon blew paper, which were done for patterns for the Great Seal, whereof two more, very curiously done by Hoskins, also for patterns.

Given to the KING. Item. A little drawing with a pen, in a black frame, of Marcus Curtius, leaping in the fiery pit at Rome, set in a black ebony frame.

Given to the KING by Mr. Surveyor. Item. A drawing in little of Prince Henry, where he is playing with a lance, being side-faced, in a black frame with a cover.

Item. Another drawing with a pen, upon white vellum, the KING's own picture on horseback.

Done by Juliano, the Italian, bought by the KING. Item. Under a large glass, that has been a looking-glass, a large drawing upon vellum, containing many little figures, being behind seen a part of a city.

Bought by the KING of Abraham Dorkender. Item. In a round wooden double turned box, the Great Seal of KING Philip and QUEEN Mary of England, impressed in red wax on both sides.

Given to the KING by my Lord Denby. Item. A double shutting black ebony wooden case, wherein are divers silver compasses and mathematical instruments, being — pieces.

Given to the KING by the French Embassador. Item. A piece of a landskip, wrought in the manner as they make Turkey carpet-work.

Here follow the number of the KING's pictures, and other things which are kept in store in several places, and are as yet unplaced, viz.

A Mantua piece, done by Antonio Corregio.

IMPRIMIS, In the cabinet-room, one large and famous picture, painted upon cloth in water-colours, kept shut in a wooden case, where they are tormenting and slaying Marfyas, whereby one sitting and stinging him with vipers, and another blowing in his left ear with a pipe, and the third slaying him, and beneath it a little young Satyr's head, being in all four entire figures, less than half so big as the life, besides the young Satyr's head, being painted in a landskip in an all-over gilded frame, in a double door shutting case.

The second, another the like abovesaid fellow piece in water-colours, of Anthony Corregio, being an unknown story, containing four entire figures in a landskip, and four angels in the clouds, containing in all eight figures, whereof one is sitting with the signs of Prudence, Obedience, Fortitude, and Justice; the other figure being sitting in the manner of a goddess of war, with a piece of a red broken staff of a lance, having a monster with a wolf's head and a dragon's tail under her feet: And the third being an Egyptian, measuring with a pair of compasses on a globe, signifying Astronomy, whereby is standing a naked child to be taught in the science; in a wooden case, and in an all-over gilded frame.

A book of pictures in wax^a, and gold, and silver, which were QUEEN Ann's, of famous memory, and was left by her Majesty to Vanderdoort for the KING, whereof nine are in wax and twelve in gold, and likewise eleven in silver, the particulars hereafter specified.

IMPRIMIS, In white wax, KING James at length, crowned, a sceptre in his right hand and a globe in the other hand, in his Parliament-ropes; done upon a black silver plate, in a green velvet case and silver hooks.

Item. The second in carnation coloured wax, being also KING James crowned, with a sceptre and globe in his hand; upon a black silver plate, being but half figures.

Item. More the like in carnation coloured wax, the KING's picture crowned, in his right hand a sceptre, and in the other hand a globe; in a black shutting box with a green velvet case.

Item. More in carnation coloured wax, upon a black plate, KING James crowned with a laurel without hands; in a black jetton turned box set in a crimson velvet case.

Item. More in carnation coloured wax, KING James's picture, crowned with laurel, without hands, in a black shutting box set in a tawney velvet case.

Item. More in an oval, KING James's picture in white wax, upon a black ground, in a black ebony eight square case, adorned at both sides with golden plate the KING's name with two letters, under an Imperial crown with a green laurel about it, and also with golden joints and hooks.

Item. The picture in white wax, upon a black round plate, of QUEEN Ann's picture, in a black turned shutting box, set in a purple velvet case with silver galloon-lace and silver hooks.

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Item. In an oval in white wax upon a black plate, the KING's picture when his Majesty was but eighteen years of age, and also his Majesty's^a arms, being the three feathers at the other side, with his Majesty's motto, *Si vis omnia subicere, subice te rationi* 1636; in a black shutting box in a green velvet case and silver galloon lace.

Item. More in gold KING James's picture, crowned with a garland of laurel, with a sceptre and globe in his hands, being one inch and three quarters over, set in a black jetton box, weighing together with the half jet box, three quarters of an ounce and a penny weight.

Item. More in gold KING James's picture between two palm branches, crowned with a garland of laurel, no hands, being in bigness one inch and a half over, weighing together in the half jetton box one half ounce, set in a crimson velvet case.

Item. More in gold, yet lesser picture of KING James, crowned with a laurel, without hands, and box weighing a four-penny weight.

Item. More in gold the picture of KING James in oval, crowned with a garland of laurel, being one inch and a half high, set in a turned black jetton box, weighing together with the half box, a quarter of an ounce, two penny weights, and nine grains.

Item. More in gold the picture of QUEEN Ann, but set in a black turned jetton box, being in bigness one inch and a half, weighing with the half box one ounce and eight grains.

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Item. More the aforesaid like picture of *QUEEN ANN*, but yet of a lesser size, being —

THIS day the Commons, in order to establish their new Commonwealth the more effectually, resolved upon the disposal of the personal Estates of the late King, Queen, and Prince; which they, this day*, made an Order to have inventoried, appraised, and sold, except such parcels of them as should be thought fit to be reserved for the use of the State; but with this proviso, to avoid the imputation of private interest, That no member of the House should have any concern therein. In this appraisement and sale were included, *heu dolor!* all the noble Collection of Pictures, antique Statues, and Bustos, which the late King, at infinite expence and trouble, had procured from Rome, and all parts of Italy. A Catalogue of these most valuable Curiosities, (many of which now adorn the palaces of the *Louvre* and the *Escorial*, as well as those of other foreign Princes) with their Appraisement and Sale, was in the hands of the late *John Anstis* senior, Esq; Garter King at Arms; from which the following Abstract is taken.

This curious and valuable catalogue, fully justifies one part of the character given of King *Charles I.* by a modern historian*. He had a good taste of learning, and a more than ordinary skill in the liberal arts, especially painting, sculpture, architecture, and medals; and being a generous benefactor to the most celebrated masters in those arts, he acquired the noblest collection of any Prince in his time, and more than all the Kings of *England* had done before him. — To the foregoing account of the sale of the Royal furniture, we shall add Lord *Clarendon's* account of the principal purchasers thereof †.

Cardinal *Mazarin*, who, in the infancy of the *French King*, managed that sceptre, had long adored the conduct of *Oliver*

Cromwell,

Cromwell, and sought his friendship by a lower and viler application, than was suitable to the purple of a Cardinal, sent now to be admitted as a merchant, to traffick in the purchase of the rich goods and jewels of the rifled Crown, of which he purchased the rich beds, hangings, and carpets, which furnished his palace at *Paris*.

The King of *Spain* had, from the beginning of the rebellion, kept *Don Alonzo de Cardenas*, who had been his Ambassador to the King, residing still at *London*; and he had, upon several occasions, many audiences from the parliament, and several treaties on foot; and, as soon as this dismal murder was over, that Ambassador, who had always a great malignity towards the King, bought as many pictures, and other precious goods appertaining to the Crown, as, being sent in ships to the *Corunna* in *Spain*, were carried from thence to *Madrid*, upon eighteen mules.

Christiana, Queen of *Sweden*, purchased the choice of all the medals and jewels, and some pictures of a great price; and received the parliament's agent with great joy and pomp, and made an alliance with them.

The Arch-duke *Leopold*, who was Governor of *Flanders*, disbursed a great sum of money for many of the best pictures, which adorned the several palaces of the King; which were all brought to him to *Brussels**, and from thence carried by him into *Germany*.

His Lordship adds, that not one of all these Princes ever restored any of their unlawful purchases to the King, after his restoration.

* Amongst the furniture bought by the Arch-duke, was a set of tapestry, the property of *Charles I.* when Prince of *Wales*. which had the arms worked in them. These, as we have been credibly informed, were purchased at *Brussels*, some few years since, for the sum of 3000*l.* by his late Royal Highness *Frederick* Prince of *Wales*; and are perhaps all that ever came back to *England*.
