THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS

Jeffrey A. Lockwood

Membership.

I am pleased to report that your Society is a vital and growing community of scientists. We currently have 338 members, which bodes well for our future. I continue to take particular pride in the geographic richness of our ranks, which now include 46 countries (with preapologies for any omissions: Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Chile, China, Cuba, Denmark, Egypt. England, France, Germany, Hungary, India, Iran, Israel, Italy, Japan, Kenya, Macau, Madagascar, Mexico, Morocco, Netherlands, New Zealand, Nigeria, Pakistan, Poland, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Seychelles, Singapore, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Syria, Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Trinidad and Tobago, United States of America, Uruguay, Zaire, and Zambia). On a continental basis, 39% of our members are North American, 28% European, 16% Asian, 9% Australian or New Zealanders, 4% African, and 4% Central and South American. It would seem that we have the potential for membership growth on all continents, but perhaps we might focus some attention on Africa and Central/South America, as these regions seem particularly underrepresented – especially with respect to the ecological and economic importance of Orthoptera.

HomePage

Actually, I can take little credit for this impressive project (other than a bit of concept and design), as my research associate, Scott Schell, developed, implemented, and updates the site. Since its premiere in early March, we have had 530 visitors to the page, which represents over five per day. As such, this appears to be an effective means of communication. The Homepage currently includes a beautiful layout (including a mostappropriate background and a spectacular image of a coneheaded grasshopper), a description of the Society, a guest book, a membership directory (including names, institutional affiliations, addresses, phone/fax numbers, e-mail addresses, and expertise listings), a bulletin board for news and queries (there are currently five postings that members will find important or interesting), a page of information on the 1997 meeting in Cairns (including great links to tour operators, a gallery of Queensland insects, with marvelous photos and brief natural history notes of local Orthoptera, and more!), the Table of Contents from the most recent issue of the Journal of Orthoptera Research, a membership application (we've already had our first member join via our Homepage), the last Research Fund call-for-papers (for those wishing to get a headstart on the next round of funding), and (most recently) a link to a fantastic "Interactive key to the Katydids of La Selva Biological Station, Costa Rica." We have received lots of constructive comments from members and some very valuable hints and materials for improving the site. Several members have sent updates of their listings in the membership directory, and we will be making the necessary modifications very soon. In the future, we also will be adding Metaleptea, our Constitution and Bylaws, a Gallery of Orthoptera, and the call-for-papers, conference tour information, and other relevant details of the Cairns meeting.

Correspondence . .

I continue to receive many queries and ideas from members regarding the functions and services of the Society. I have had over 120 e-mail messages since the first of the year, which doesn't include the letters arriving via regular post (*Hint*: I have a strong ability for vicarious travel, so notes and requests on picture postcards are gladly and enthusiastically received!). With an average of more than a message a day from members, I am convinced that we are an active and healthy scientific Society! I apologize for having been rather delayed in some of my correspondence, as I have been doing double-duty as Executive Director and Treasurer while Roger Bland has been on sabbatical. He should be back in the States by the time you receive this newsletter, and I shall be genuinely overjoyed by his return. I hope that we will have the 1996 membership statements out be mid-summer, although I haven't heard any grumbling about the delay in billing! I would particularly ask that members with outstanding page charges to *JOR* bring their accounts up-to-date. Our publication rates

are extremely reasonable, particularly if one considers the page size and quality of JOR. The Journal seems to be on solid economic footing (with our last issue actually breaking even!), but we need to be conscientious about publication charges.

And still more good news – a most generous gift from CIRAD-GERDAT-PRIFAS (Center of International Cooperation in Agronomic Research for Development, Operational Acridology Ecoforces International) of \$1,000 (which will be matched by our anonymous donor) has put the Orthopterists' Society Research Fund in very fine shape. There are some restrictions on the nature of research that can be supported with this recent gift, but many of our members will find themselves very well positioned to compete for these funds. Be sure to keep an eye out for the Research Funds' next Call-for-proposals, which should be sent out this Fall!

Finally, there is every indication that the Cairns meeting will be one of our most spectacular and successful events. Dave Rentz and Roger Farrow are making great headway. Roger allowed me to preview the itinerary of the post-conference trip, and it looks wonderfully planned and temptingly priced. I shall be encouraging symposia organizers to assemble their speakers in the near future, and I will be receiving and organizing submitted papers as titles arrive in the coming months. In addition, nominations are now being accepted for new Governing Board officers. Please feel free to submit your name or that of a colleague (it would be ideal if you had an indication of their willingness to accept a nomination, but if you wish to remain anonymous I would be pleased to make the initial contact). In this context, please carefully and seriously consider accepting a nomination if you are contacted – the Society needs an active, member-driven Board to remain a vital community of scientists. We are also accepting nominations for Honorary Membership, which is our highest honor and should be reserved for our most outstanding members. Finally, the Board is developing nominations for the D.C.F. Rentz Awards to recognize the contributions of our members in various fields of orthopterology. You can see that the coming months will be a very busy time, but the big payoff will come Down Under next year!



Call for Papers

At the 1997 Society meeting, we will offer four formats for presentation of studies.

Symposia

We have identified five topics that are currently being developed as symposia:

- "Biological Control of Orthoptera", Convenor: R. Farrow (Australia)
- "Conservation of Orthopteran Biodiversity", Convenor: M. Samways (South Africa)
- "Grasshopper Population and Community Ecology", Convenor: W. Kemp (USA)
- "Orthopteran Biochemistry and Molecular Endocrinology", Convenor: K. Hoffmann (Germany)
- "Orthopteran Communication", Convenor: W. Cade (Canada)

Additional symposia of interest to the membership (e.g. feeding and nutrition, taxonomy and phylogenetics, etc.) can be added to the program. Individuals willing to convene a symposium must contact the Program Chair with a title and list of participants by March 1, 1997. All individuals participating in announce or new symposia should submit a Presentation Request form and abstract such that these materials are received by the Program Chair by March 1, 1997.

Oral Presentations

Individuals wishing to make oral presentations must submit a Presentation Request form and abstract such that these materials are received by the Program Chair by March 1, 1997. The time allowance for oral presentations will depend on the number of submissions, but we anticipate 12-15 minutes for each speaker. Speakers will be notified of the time restrictions by April 1. Presentation slides should be 2x2 inch, 35 mm and as uncluttered as possible. High quality, overhead transparencies may be used as well. As a courtesy to members who are colourblind, please try to avoid red or green. The oral presentations will be arranged with respect to the organism of study. As such, individuals should be sure to indicate on the Presentation Request form which group of Orthoptera were the object of study.

Poster Presentations

Individuals are encouraged to consider poster presentations. These displays have the advantage of allowing greater details, more time for discussion, and greater exposure at the conference. Those wishing to present a poster must submit a Presentation Request form and abstract such that these materials are received by July 1, 1997. Posters must fit in a 4x6 ft. area, and we anticipate being able to maintain the displays throughout the meeting.

Abstract Only

Individuals may choose to submit an abstract only for inclusion in the Meeting Abstracts, Metaleptea, and the Proceedings. Those wishing to participate in this manner should submit a Presentation Request form and abstract such that these materials are received by July 1, 1997. We will be providing participants with a collection of abstracts at the meeting.

General Information

Transport

There are ten international airlines operating 184 scheduled international aircraft movements each week at Cairns International Airport. Regular bus transfers from the airport to the city are available.

Immigration and Visa Requirements

Nationals of all countries, except New Zealand, require a passport and visa for entry to Australia. New Zealand residents require a passport only. Participants from, or passing through certain countries, may require immunisation against certain diseases. Visas may be obtained from your nearest Australian High Commission, Embassy or Consulate or, if none are available, through the nearest British Embassy or Consulate.

Personal Insurance

Health Care, dental and ambulance services are not free in Australia. We strongly recommend that you take out a comprehensive medical and travel insurance, which should cover the possibility of cancellation due to strikes and other causes. A condition of registration is that the Orthopterists' Society International Conference, its servants and its agents, accept no responsibility of any nature whatsoever for personal injury, death, or loss or damage to property of participants, however caused or arising.

Illustrations and Figures

Illustrations should be planned for reduction to the dimension of the printed page (13.5 x 19.4 cm, column width 6.3 cm) and allow room for legends at the top and bottom. Do not make plates larger than 14" x 18" (35 x 45 cm). Individual figures should be mounted on a suitable drawing board or similar heavy stock. Photographs should be trimmed, grouped together and abutted when mounted. Figure numbers should be on the plate. Include title, author(s) and address(es), and illustration numbers on back of each plate. Original figures should accompany the original manuscript when presented to the editor. Reference to figures/tables in the text should be in the style "(Fig. 1)" "(Table 1)". Measurements should be in the metric system.

Scientific Names and Taxonomy Papers

All papers must conform to the International Code of Zoological Nomenclature. The first mention of a plant or animal should include the full scientific name including the authority. Genus names should not be abbreviated at the beginning of a sentence. In taxonomic papers type specimens must be clearly designated, type depositories must be clearly indicated, and new taxa must be clearly differentiated from existing taxa by means of keys or differential diagnoses. Basically, the papers must conform to good taxonomic practices. Authors are required to deposit all type material in nationally or internationally recognized institutions (not private collections). Voucher specimens should be designated for specimens used in behavioral or autecological studies, and they should be deposited similarly.

Acceptance of taxonomic papers will not require use of cladistic methods; however, authors using them will be expected to specify the phylogenetic program used (if any), including discussion of program options used. If characters are run nonadditively, this should be stated along with weighting criteria. A data matrix should be provided if the subject is complex. Cladograms must be hung with characters and these should include descriptors (not numbers alone) when feasible. If there are multiple equally parsimonious cladograms, the exact number should be stated, and reasons given for the one adopted. Lengths and consistency indices should be provided. Adequate discussions should be given for characters, plesiomorphic conditions, and distributions of characters among outgroups when problematical.

Citing References

References in the text should be (Smith 1999), without a comma, or Smith (1999). Two articles by a single author should be (Smith 1999a, 1999b) or Smith (1999a, 1999b). For papers in press, use "in press," not the expected publication date. The Literature Cited section should include all papers referred to in the paper. Journal names should be spelled out completely.

Bibliographic references should appear at the end of the text with references cited to conform with the following format (see examples):

Jones, AB, Smith, XY, Young, BN. 1979. A study on the morphology of Teleogryllus oceanicus (Gryllidae). Journal of Comparative Morphology 23: 94-8.

Otte, D. 1989. Speciation in Hawaiian crickets. pp. 483-526, In: T. Sebeok (ed.) How Animals Communicate. 9ed.). Bloomington, Indiana, USA.

[Note the formatting of "multiple author" citations and all punctuation standards in the above two examples. DO NOT enclose the date of publication within parentheses.]

Charges

Publication charges are as follows: \$20 (US) per page due with reprint order, 1-page abstracts will be charged the minimal \$20 page charge. Cost of reprints has not been determined as yet. At least one author of the paper must be a member. There are no free reprints. Reprints are charged to the author and must be ordered when returning the proofs. Author's corrections and changes in proof are also charged to the author. Color plates will be billed at full cost to the author.



The Mantis Study Group (MSG) was formed in May 1996 to facilitate the study and rearing of praying mantids. Membership is open to anyone with an interest in these insects.

The MSG aims to produce a Newsletter every three months. This will contain a variety of articles with an emphasis on captive breeding.

There is currently a livestock co-ordinator for the U.K. and it is hoped that when membership increases there will be volunteers to co-ordinate livestock in other countries. The livestock coordinator has two tasks:

Maintain a list of members who have males available for breeding so that members can contact the co-ordinator if they have a female which requires a mate.

Maintain a list of members wanting newly hatched nymphs, so other members can

easily disperse their surplus stock. This system works only if members keep the co-ordinator up to date with what they have available for loan or distribution. Members receiving livestock are responsible for paying the postage costs of the person sending the livestock. It is hoped members will not charge for newly hatched nymphs (especially of species that produce large numbers), and an agreement to share oothecae is preferable to charging for the services of males. However, the decision to give away or to charge for livestock is left to the discretion of the supplier.

A list of names, addresses and telephone numbers of members is issued, which must not be passed on to any other individual or organisation. Membership runs from 1st January to 31st December. Payment should be made by one of the following methods:



THE ORTHOPTERISTS' SOCIETY FIELD GUIDE SERIES

The Field Guides are pocket-sized publications intended for use in the field by workers concerned with pest species of locusts or grasshoppers, in English, French or Spanish, or combination of these, as appropriate for the intended region.

The series originally was arranged in four parts: Introduction; General Topics; Specific Pests; and Pest Species of a Region. It was set up as an open-ended series in each of the latter three categories so that other *Field Guides* could be added in any of them should this become desirable.

Field Guides are not intended to be sold; they are for free distribution by FAO, CIRAD/PRIFAS, or other organization in a region where they will be useful.

All manuscripts are subject to peer review (after general editing) and may be returned to authors for revision; all pages from the printing firm will be sent to authors for checking before final printing. [I was unable to have authors make final checks before printing in 1991, due to unexpected deadline imposed on funding so that all *Guides* had to be printed and printing firms paid by that date. Some errors exist in 4 of the printed *Field Guides*].

Only one paper was written in the B series, that by Dr. S.K. Gangwere and published as B4E. It might have been better to dispense with the B series. I deliberately shelved the Introductory (A) series, although these were ready for printing in all three languages. It seemed pointless to pay for printing the introduc-

tory Guides unless funds were available for publication of the entire series. Also, I decided not to print the Field Guide on North American pest species because other parts of the world have problems that are more serious than in that region. I have shelved the four Field Guides that I have written at a cost of considerable personal time and effort. I may eventually have the North American guide printed at personal cost but the introductory ones are permanently shelved.

If the project has to be discontinued, Dr. Gangwere has undertaken to publish the manuscripts at hand in a single volume, provided that I supply him with the completely edited manuscripts.

Should another source of funding be found, I am prepared to continue working on the Field Guides on behalf of the Society. I thought there would be no difficulty in obtaining funding once the quality of the original 12 Field Guides was seen, but so much for day dreams. This has not happened, except in the case of the Guide on pests of Australia for which the cost was underwritten by The Biological and Chemical Research Institute, Entomology Branch, New South Wales Agriculture. This guide was published and has been sent to Australia.

This is the first time that the literature on orthopteroids has been brought together in a single series and will be indispensable for research workers on orthopteroid insects in the future. I have used it extensively and have found it to be an invaluable tool in research. The general arrangement is good and easy to follow. I recommend it highly. Every library and research establishment should have it. I wish to express my admiration to Dan Otte and his helpers for this tremendous upgrading of the accessibility to data concerning this section of the orthopteroid insects. I hope the series will be continued to include all of the remaining taxa, those of the "Ensifera" ("Grylloptera").

This massive undertaking by Dan Otte will be the cornerstone of orthopteran research for many years to come. The five volumes so far published cover the Grylloidea (Volume 1, 3,511 species listed) and the Acridomorpha (Volumes 2-5, with over 10,000 species). In addition to full synonymies, type locations and general distributions of the species are given. Where appropriate, subspecies are also documented.

While this may seem to be a work for taxonomists, anyone doing comparative studies on insects in these groups will have cause to refer to the File. What is the geographical distribution of this subfamily? To what extent has this genus diversified? Even, have I given the correct name? The answers to these and many more questions are to be found in these books. They form an essential underpinning for any of our studies that go beyond the single species, whether our primary interest is in ecology, behavior, morphology, physiology or, needless to say, taxonomy, phylogeny and evolution.

Just turning the pages, and noting the passing comment "I have consulted the entire Zoological Record...", gives one an appreciation of the work involved in this compilation. It is a labor, not just of love, but of enduring value to all of us. It is a must for the library of any institution involved in teaching or research on Orthoptera.
