## Measurement of the Cross Section for  $e^+e^-\to \Lambda\bar\Lambda$  and Observation of the Decay  $\psi(3770)\to \Lambda\bar\Lambda$

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The Born cross section of the process  $e^+e^- \to \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  is measured at 33 center-of-mass energies between 3.51 and 4.60 GeV using data corresponding to the total integrated luminosity of 20.0 fb<sup>−</sup><sup>1</sup> collected with the BESIII detector at the BEPCII collider. Describing the energy dependence of the cross section requires a justification from the  $\psi(3770) \to \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  decay, which is fitted with a significance of 4.9 $\sigma$  with the systematic uncertainty included. The lower bound on its branching fraction is  $2.4 \times 10^{-6}$  at the 90% confidence level (C.L.), at least five times larger than expected from predictions using a simple scaling approach. This result indicates the importance of effects from vector charmonium(-like) when interpreting data in terms of *e.g.*, electromagnetic structure observables. There are no definite conclusions about the interplay with other vector charmonium(-like), and we set 90% C.L. upper limits for the products of the electronic widths and the branching fractions.

Two-body baryonic decays of vector  $(J^{PC} = 1^{--})$ charmonium(-like) provide a testing ground of the Quantum Chromodynamics predictions [\[1,](#page-6-0) [2](#page-6-1)]. The  $\psi(3770)$  vector meson is believed to be a conventional  $c\bar{c}$  state located above the open-charm threshold and is expected to decay into a  $DD$  meson pair with a branching fraction of 99% or more [\[3](#page-6-2)]. However, in addition to the  $c\bar{c}$  pair, if there are some constituent gluons or light quarks and antiquarks, the decay modes to the light-quark systems will be enhanced [\[4\]](#page-6-3). In 2003, the BES Collaboration observed the first non-DD decay of  $\psi(3770)$ into  $J/\psi \pi^+ \pi^-$  [\[5](#page-6-4), [6](#page-6-5)]. Subsequently, the CLEO Collaboration confirmed the observation and found more non- $D\bar{D}$  decays of  $\psi(3770)$  [\[7–](#page-6-6)[9\]](#page-6-7) and the first decay into light-quark hadrons  $\psi(3770) \rightarrow \phi \eta$  [\[10\]](#page-6-8). In addition, the production of the baryon–antibaryon ( $B\bar{B}$ ) final states in charmonium(-like) decay have relatively simpler topology and interaction picture. Thus, the experimental study of  $e^+e^- \rightarrow B\bar{B}$  can clarify the nature of the  $\psi(3770)$  charmless decays. In an early study, the BESIII collaboration has already found evidence for the interference effect in  $e^+e^- \to p\bar{p}$  in the vicinity of  $\psi(3770)$  [\[11\]](#page-6-9).

In the past two decades, several vector states were observed at energies between 3.7 and 4.7 GeV at various  $e^+e^-$  colliders. Four charmonium(-like) predicted by potential mod-els [\[1](#page-6-0)]  $\psi(3770)$ ,  $\psi(4040)$ ,  $\psi(4160)$  and  $\psi(4415)$  are well established and seen in the inclusive hadronic cross section [\[12](#page-6-10)]. In addition, new states such as  $Y(4230)$ ,  $Y(4260)$ ,  $Y(4360)$ ,  $X(4390), Y(4660),$  were reported using the initial state radiation (ISR) processes  $e^+e^- \rightarrow \gamma_{ISR}\pi^+\pi^- J/\psi(\psi(3686))$ at the BABAR [\[13](#page-6-11)[–16\]](#page-6-12) and Belle experiments [\[17](#page-6-13)[–21](#page-6-14)], or in energy-scan experiments at CLEO-c [\[22\]](#page-7-0) and BESIII [\[23](#page-7-1)– [28\]](#page-7-2). Up to now, no evidence for decay modes into light-quark baryon–antibaryon pairs of these charmonium(-like) is found. The overpopulation of vector charmonium(-like) with respect to predictions from potential models , and the difficulty in describing the properties of these states make them attractive candidates for exotic states [\[29](#page-7-3)].

In addition, knowledge of the vector charmonium(-like) coupling to the  $B\bar{B}$  final states is crucial for understanding the electromagnetic structure of the baryons. In Refs. [\[30,](#page-7-4) [31\]](#page-7-5), the time-like electromagnetic form factors (EMFFs) for the ground-state octet baryons were measured based on the CLEO-c data. It is assumed that the branching fractions of  $\psi(3770)$  to the BB final states scale with the decay widths into a pair of electrons (electronic decay widths) comparing to the  $\psi(3686)$  state, *e.g.*, branching fraction  $\mathcal{B}(\psi(3770) \rightarrow$  $(\Lambda \bar{\Lambda}) \approx 5 \times 10^{-7}$ , and therefore are negligible.

In this Letter, we present a measurement of the Born cross section for the  $e^+e^- \to \Lambda\bar{\Lambda}$  process using data correspond-ing to a total integrated luminosity of 20.0 fb<sup>-1</sup> [32-[34\]](#page-7-7) collected at center-of-mass (c.m.) energies  $\sqrt{s}$  between 3.51 and 4.60 GeV with the BESIII detector [\[35,](#page-7-8) [36](#page-7-9)] at the BEPCII collider [\[37\]](#page-7-10). We extract the  $\Lambda$  effective form factor and report an evidence of the  $\psi(3770) \rightarrow \Lambda\Lambda$  process by fitting the  $e^+e^- \rightarrow \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  dressed cross section.

Candidates for the  $e^+e^- \rightarrow \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  events are reconstructed using the  $\Lambda \to p\pi^-$  and  $\bar{\Lambda} \to \bar{p}\pi^+$  decay modes. The detection efficiency is determined by Monte Carlo (MC) simulations. A sample of 100,000 events is simulated for each of the 33 c.m. energy points. The production process is simulated by the KKMC generator [\[38,](#page-7-11) [39](#page-7-12)] that includes corrections for the ISR effects. The  $\Lambda$  and  $\bar{\Lambda}$  decays are handled by the EVTGEN [\[40](#page-7-13)] program. The response of the BESIII detector is modeled with MC simulations using a framework based on GEANT4 [\[41](#page-7-14)].

Tracks of charged particles are reconstructed in the multilayer drift chamber with a helical fit which should have a good quality. These tracks should be within  $|\cos \theta| < 0.93$ , where  $\theta$  is the polar angle with respect to the  $e^+$  beam direction. Events with two successfully reconstructed negativelycharged and two positively-charged particles are kept for further analysis.

To reconstruct  $\Lambda(\bar{\Lambda})$  candidates, we apply a secondary vertex fit [\[42](#page-7-15)] to all pairs of positive and negative charged particles. The corresponding  $\chi^2$  value is required to be less than 500. The track combination with minimum  $|M_{p\pi^{-}} - m_{\Lambda}|^{2} + |M_{\bar{p}\pi^{+}} - m_{\Lambda}|^{2}$  is selected, where  $M_{p\pi^-}(M^-_{\bar{p}\pi^+})$  is the invariant mass of the  $p\pi^-(\bar{p}\pi^+)$  pair, and  $m_\Lambda$  is the world-average  $\Lambda$  mass value from the Particle Data Group (PDG) [\[12\]](#page-6-10). To further suppress background from non-Λ processes, the Λ decay length is required to be larger than zero, where the negative decay lengths are caused by the limited detector resolution.

To further suppress background and improve the mass resolution, a four-constraint (4C) kinematic fit imposing energymomentum conservation is applied for the  $\Lambda\bar{\Lambda}$  hypothesis. The  $\chi^2_{4C}$  of the fit is required to be less than 200. Figure [1](#page-4-0) shows the distribution of  $M_{p\pi}$ – versus  $M_{\bar{p}\pi}$ + of the accepted candidates from all data samples. Clear peaks around the Λ known mass can be discerned. The invariant mass  $M_{p\pi-}$  is re-

quired to be within 5 MeV/ $c^2$  of the known  $\Lambda(\bar{\Lambda})$  mass as the signal region marked by S. After applying the above selection criteria, the survived background events are mainly from non- $\Lambda(\bar{\Lambda})$  events, such as  $e^+e^- \to \pi^+\pi^-p\bar{p}$ . The background yield in the signal region is estimated using four sideband regions  $B_i$ , where  $i = 1, 2, 3, 4$ , each with the same area as the signal region. The regions are shown in Fig. [1,](#page-4-0) and the exact ranges are given in the Supplemental Material [\[32\]](#page-7-6). The signal yield  $N_{obs}$  for  $e^+e^- \rightarrow \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  events at each energy point can then be extracted by subtracting the number of events in the sideband regions from the number of events in the signal region,  $N_S$ :  $N_{obs} = N_S - \frac{1}{4} \sum_{i=1}^{4} N_{B_i}$ , and they are listed in Table [I.](#page-5-0)

The dressed cross section  $\sigma^{\rm dr}$  for the process  $e^+e^- \to \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$ is defined as

$$
\sigma^{\rm dr}(s) = \frac{N_{obs}}{\mathcal{L}(1+\delta)\epsilon \mathcal{B}^2(\Lambda \to p\pi^-)} , \qquad (1)
$$

where  $\mathcal L$  is the integrated luminosity at given c.m. energy  $\sqrt{s}$ ,  $(1 + \delta)$  is the ISR correction factor [\[39,](#page-7-12) [43](#page-7-16)],  $\epsilon$  is the detection efficiency, and the branching fraction  $\mathcal{B}(\Lambda \to p\pi^-)$  =  $(63.9 \pm 0.5)\%$  is taken from PDG. The ISR correction factor is obtained using the calculation described in Ref. [\[44\]](#page-7-17), where the dressed cross sections are adopted as initial input and are iterated to obtain stable result. The dressed cross section is related to the Born cross section via the vacuum polarization factor  $\frac{1}{|1-\Pi|^2}$  [\[45\]](#page-7-18) as  $\sigma^{\text{dr}} = \sigma^B/|1-\Pi|^2$  (further details are provided in the Supplemental Material [\[32\]](#page-7-6)).

Systematic uncertainties on the cross section measurement mainly come from the luminosity measurement, the  $\Lambda$  reconstruction, the 4C kinematic fit, the branching fraction for the decay  $\Lambda \to p\pi^-$ , the line-shape description, and the physical model dependence. The uncertainty due to the vacuum polarization is negligible. The integrated luminosity is measured by  $e^+e^- \rightarrow (\gamma)e^+e^-$  events with a similar method to Ref. [\[33\]](#page-7-19) with an uncertainty of 1.0%. The systematic uncertainty of the  $\Lambda(\bar{\Lambda})$  reconstruction incorporating the tracking, the mass window of  $\Lambda(\Lambda)$ , and the decay length of  $\Lambda(\Lambda)$  is studied using a control sample of  $\psi(3686) \rightarrow \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  decay with the same method as introduced in Refs. [\[46](#page-7-20)[–50\]](#page-7-21). The signal MC sample is simulated using a DIY model [\[51\]](#page-7-22) implementing the joint angular distribution from Refs. [\[52,](#page-7-23) [53](#page-7-24)]. The efficiency difference between data and MC simulation is found to be 0.5% for the  $\Lambda$  reconstruction and 1.5% for the  $\Lambda$  reconstruction. The uncertainty from the 4C kinematic fit is studied using the control sample of  $\psi(3686) \rightarrow \Lambda \overline{\Lambda}$  decays with and without performing a 4C kinematic fit. The relative change of 1.0% is assigned as the systematic uncertainty. The uncertainty of the branching fraction for  $\Lambda \to p\pi^-$  from the PDG [\[12\]](#page-6-10) is 0.8%, and is propagated to the final result. The uncertainty from the line-shape description is estimated with an alternative input cross section line shape based on a simple powerlaw function. The change of the efficiency, 2.6%, is taken as the systematic uncertainty. The uncertainty due to the physical model dependence is estimated to be 2.5% by comparing the efficiencies between phase space and the DIY model incorporating the Λ transverse polarization and spin correlation based on the control sample of  $\psi(3770) \to \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$  decays. Assuming all sources are independent, the total systematic uncertainty on the cross section measurement is determined to be 4.3% by adding these sources in quadrature. The correlations for the different points are negligible due to the limited statistics.

The extracted Born cross sections at each energy point are listed in Table [I](#page-5-0) and shown in Fig.  $2(top)$  $2(top)$  together with the CLEO-c results at 3.770 GeV and 4.160 GeV [\[30](#page-7-4), [31\]](#page-7-5). Figure [2\(](#page-5-1)bottom) shows the extracted energy dependence of the  $Λ$  effective form factor  $G_{\text{eff}}(s)$  defined as [\[55\]](#page-7-25)

$$
G_{\text{eff}}(s) = \sqrt{\frac{3s\tau\sigma^B}{2\pi\alpha^2\beta(2\tau + 1)}},\qquad(2)
$$

where  $\alpha$  is the fine-structure constant,  $\beta = \sqrt{(\tau - 1)/\tau}$  is the  $Λ$  velocity and  $τ = s/(4m<sub>Λ</sub><sup>2</sup>)$ .

The dressed cross section for the continuum  $e^+e^- \to \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$ process is expected to have an asymptotic power-law behavior  $\propto s^{-n}$  with the exponent  $n \approx 10$  [\[55](#page-7-25)[–57\]](#page-7-26). A least- $\chi^2$  fit including statistical and systematic uncertainties to the powerlaw distribution describes the data points reasonably well, as shown with the dashed line in Fig. [3.](#page-6-15) The fitted value of the exponent  $n$  is close to 10, as shown in the column "Fit I" in Table [II.](#page-5-2) A fit with the coherent sum of the power-law function and a Breit–Wigner (BW) function

$$
\sigma^{\rm dr}(s) = \left| \sqrt{\sigma_0} \left( \frac{M}{\sqrt{s}} \right)^n + e^{i\phi} \text{BW}(s) \right|^2 \tag{3}
$$

is applied, where M is the  $\psi(3770)$  mass,  $\sigma_0$  is the value of the continuum cross section at  $\psi(3770)$  and  $\phi$  is the relative

phase between the continuum and the resonance. The BW function is

BW(s) = 
$$
\frac{\sqrt{\sigma_{\psi}}MT}{s - M^2 + iMT}
$$
 with  $\sigma_{\psi} = \frac{12\pi (\hbar c)^2 \Gamma_{ee} \mathcal{B}}{\Gamma M^2}$ , (4)

where  $\Gamma$  and  $\Gamma_{ee}$  are the total and the electronic width of the  $\psi(3770)$  resonance, respectively, and B denotes the branching fraction to  $\Lambda\Lambda$ . The solid line in Fig. [3](#page-6-15) and the column "Fit II" in Table [II](#page-5-2) shows the result of the fit with two solutions, where the mass and width of  $\psi(3770)$  are fixed accord-ing to the PDG values [\[12](#page-6-10)], and  $\sigma_0$ ,  $n$ ,  $\phi$  and  $\sigma_\psi$  parameters are free. The improvement of the  $\chi^2$  value gives a significance of 4.9 $\sigma$  for the hypothesis with the  $\psi(3770)$  resonance. The correlation coefficient between the resonance cross section  $\sigma_{\psi}$  and the phase  $\phi$  is almost equal to one. In the "Fit II", two solutions are expected according to the mathemati-

cal calculation [\[58,](#page-7-28) [59](#page-7-29)], but they are merged with each other within the uncertainty of  $1\sigma$  due to the statistics limitation so that only one solution is provided. Our results can be summarized by giving 90% C.L. intervals  $24 < \sigma_{\psi} < 1800$  fb and  $2.4 \times 10^{-6} < \mathcal{B} < 1.8 \times 10^{-4}$ , and represents the first evidence of the decay  $\psi(3770) \rightarrow \Lambda \bar{\Lambda}$ . Note that the systematic uncertainties due to beam energy, mass and width of the  $\psi(3770)$  resonance have been considered by varying the known value within one standard deviation, and they turn out to be negligible. This result is larger by at least an order of magnitude than the prediction based on the scaling from the branching fractions values at the  $\psi(3686)$  resonance [\[30,](#page-7-4) [31](#page-7-5)], implying that it need to consider interpreting the CLEO-c data in terms of EMFFs.

Finally, we have included in the fit an additional charmonium state:  $\psi(4040)$ ,  $\psi(4160)$ ,  $Y(4260)$  and  $\psi(4415)$ . Since the significance of each of these is smaller than  $3\sigma$ , we quote upper limits at the 90% C.L. for the  $\Gamma_{ee}B$  products:  $< 5.5 \times 10^{-3}$  eV for  $\psi(4040)$ ,  $< 0.7 \times 10^{-3}$  eV for  $\psi(4160)$ , < 0.8 × 10<sup>-3</sup> eV for  $Y(4260)$  and < 1.8 × 10<sup>-3</sup> eV for  $\psi$ (4415) including the systematic uncertainty. These results provide the important information to understand the nature of charmonium(-like) states above open charm threshold and in particular their coupling to the  $B\overline{B}$  final states and even insight into the puzzle of large non- $D\overline{D}$  component of  $\psi(3770)$ .

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
